Crafty Extras:

The Retro Diner Counter (#5927) was faced with a section of #7022 Red Oak Flooring then painted with two coats of Benjamin Moore's Hale Navy (HC-154) soft-gloss acrylic paint. The cabinets received the same paint.

The Eaves Bracket (#7027) serves to support both the rod and the shelf. The shelf was made from Strip Wood (#9149) and cut to length. Its outside edges are flush with the brackets' outside edges. Glue the shelf to both brackets. Paint visible surfaces with Sherwin-Williams' Simply White OC-117 semi-gloss acrylic paint.

The rod is made of a bamboo skewer cut to length. Note that the bracket has a drilled hole design; we use this design to support the rod. The rod will rest inside the larger of the holes without protruding beyond the hole, unless you want it to be visible. Paint the rod with Benjamin Moore's Hale Navy (HC-154) soft-gloss acrylic paint, let it dry, then thread it into the larger of the holes in each of the two brackets. Glue in place. Glue the assembly to the kitchen wall. Lastly, twist jewelry eye pins into hooks, cut to length and glue them to the hanging rod.
